Jesus condemned a Pharisee who boosted of his righteous behavior, while celebrating a hated tax collector who stood in the corner and confessed his sin.

About 68 million of the 94 million men in the United States do not attend any church. Some of them stay home because they are turned off by the seeming self-righteousness of some church members.

The absence of these men helps explain the membership decline of most mainline churches.

A study by Horner, Ralston and Sunde found that when a child becomes a participant in a Sunday school class or youth group, the family will follow about 3.5 percent of the time. If the mother begins attending a church, the rest of the family follows 17 percent of the time. But when a father comes to faith in Christ, the rest of the family follows 93 percent of the time.

If you reach the men, you reach their families.

The number one reason a man becomes interested in a church-related activity is because he is invited by another man.

He will probably attend a ball game, barbecue, or work on a Habitat House before he attends a worship service.

Today is Men's Ministry Sunday, a day to celebrate the many ways in which men contribute to the vitality of our congregation and an opportunity to think about ways we can reach men outside the church
